Each year, churches in the Minnesota Annual Conference take a Love Offering for missions. The offering is brought to annual conference session—a gathering of United Methodist clergy and laity from across the state.

The theme of the 2024 Annual Conference session-taking place in Bloomington on May 29-30– is "Jesus Redeemer."

The Love Offering this year will help our neighbors—in Minnesota and around the world—heal from trauma and find safety.

The funds from this year's offering will go to a new United Methodist trauma care center in Ukraine (30%), immigration legal support in partnership with Volunteer Lawyer Network (30%), special programming aimed at reducing trauma at Emma Norton Services' new Restoring Waters development (30%), and Volunteers in Mission Scholarships (10%).

From the Pastor – May

In 2024, NAMI will promote the theme of **'Take the Moment'** throughout all awareness events, including Mental Health Month.

Since its inception in 1949, Mental Health Awareness Month has been a cornerstone of addressing the challenges faced by millions of Americans living with mental health conditions. Throughout May, NAMI actively participates in this national movement, dedicated to eradicating stigma, extending support, fostering public education, and advocating for policies that prioritize the well-being of individuals and families affected by mental illness. Mental Health Awareness Month provides a perfect opportunity for the NAMI Alliance, our partners and ambassadors to shine a spotlight on NAMI's work — our mental health resources, local programs and initiatives, as well as helpful information that is available for specific populations such as caregivers, youth and young adults and underrepresented communities.

Why this cause is important: One in 5 Americans is affected by mental health conditions. Stigma is toxic to their mental health because it creates an environment of shame, fear and silence that prevents many people from seeking help and treatment. The perception of mental illness won't change unless we act to change it.

Campaign manifesto: There's a virus spreading across America. It harms the 1 in 5 Americans affected by mental health conditions. It shames them into silence. It prevents them from seeking help. And in some cases, it takes lives. What virus are we talking about? It's stigma. Stigma against people with mental health conditions. But there's good news. Stigma is 100% curable. Compassion, empathy and understanding are the antidote. Your voice can spread the cure. Join NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness. Together we can **#CureStigma**.

- Mental health is essential to everyone's overall health and well-being, and mental illnesses are common and treatable.
- So much of what we do physically impacts us mentally. Paying attention to both your physical health and your mental health can help you achieve overall wellness and set you on a path to recovery.
- A healthy lifestyle can help to prevent the onset or worsening of mental health conditions, as well as heart disease, diabetes, obesity and other chronic health problems. It can also help people recover from these conditions. Taking good care of your body is part of a Before Stage Four approach to mental health.
- Eating healthy foods, managing stress, exercising, and getting enough sleep can go a long way in making you both physically and mentally healthy.
- Getting the appropriate amount of exercise benefits nearly all aspects of a person's health. Not only does exercise help control weight, it also improves mental health, and chances of living longer and healthier.
- Recent research is connecting your gut health with your mental health. So, when it comes to diet and nutrition, it's all about finding the right balance of nutrients to benefit both the mind and body.
- Sleep plays a role in all aspects of our life and overall health. Getting a good night's sleep is important to having enough physical and mental energy to take on daily responsibilities.
- Stress has a huge impact on our lives and can make even day-to-day life difficult. Research shows that stress is closely linked to high blood pressure, heart disease and obesity. It also shows that people who feel depressed or chronically stressed may have a greater risk of physical illnesses.
- Living a healthy lifestyle may not be easy but can be achieved by gradually making small changes and building on those successes.



PRAYER FOR THE WORLD

Iraq— A large proportion of Iraq's remaining Christian population now live in Iraqi Kurdistan. The ethnic cleansing and conquest of Mosul and the Plains of Nineveh (the historic center of Iraqi Christianity) by Islamic State (IS) militants in 2014 caused huge numbers of



Christians to flee to Erbil in the east or Dohuk in the north, the two largest cities in Iraqi Kurdistan.

The very few who remained, and those who have tried to return to their homes since the area was liberated from IS control, face an uncertain future in a country led by a fragmented Shia government not supported by many minority Sunnis. Many Christians' homes in this area were occupied by IS, some were destroyed and others fraudulently sold, so many families have nothing to return to. Furthermore, the brief IS occupation has created an ongoing "culture of hate" among Muslims toward Christians.

In June and July 2020, a Turkish air campaign against the Kurdish PKK fighters inflicted terror on civilians, whether Kurdish or Assyrian (i.e. Christians). Zakho district in Dohuk Province is home to around 12,000 Christians in about 20 villages. The airstrikes emptied nine of the 11 Christian villages in the sub-district of Darkar and left the agricultural land burned. Hundreds of Christians were forced to flee, many of them people who had already fled from their homes in the Plains of Nineveh in 2014. It is estimated that around 75% of Iraq's Christian population (around 1.5 million believers in 1990) have left the country altogether in the last 30 years, due to anti-Christian hostility and violence, which began after the 1990-91 Gulf War and intensified after the fall of Saddam Hussein's regime in 2003.

Ask the Lord to protect and strengthen Iraqi Christians who feel unsafe in their homeland. Pray that God will guide those who are displaced as to where to settle down. Pray that their community and the Iraqi government will enable a Christian heartland to be reestablished in Iraq.
